A Brief Guide to Some Chemical Agreements and Conventions

CHEMICALS - DIFFERENT combinations of the 100+ elements found in the world - make up all the living and inanimate matter in the world. There would be no life without them. But producing and using those combinations can pose problems, which is why we need agreements on how to manage them.

SAICM is a one-stop shop for high-level, multi-sector chemical management, but it does not work in a vacuum.
